


Nebraska's Rural-Urban Partisan Divide

The partisan divide between Nebraska's largest metro areas - Omaha and Lincoln and the rest of the state has been growing.

Even so, from Reagan to Obama, the state's urban and rural voters shifted mostly in the same direction with each presidential election.

But 2016 was different. The metro counties shifted toward the Democratic candidate, while almost all other counties shifted dramatically toward the Republican, leaving the widest partisan divide in 10 presidential elections.





Small & Medium Cities


24 counties with cities of 5,000 or more, including Hall, Buffalo, and Dodge
